Behind every number there is a broken story.

Human trafficking knows no age, gender, or nationality.

It is a silent crime that turns promises into chains and dreams into merchandise. Seeing this face is the first step to stopping it.

The invisible hurricane

This is how human trafficking operates:

It doesn't start with violence — it starts with seduction.

Traffickers infiltrate their victims' lives by feigning affection, friendship, or romance.

**FIRST THEY CHARM. THEN THEY ISOLATE.
FINALLY, THEY CONTROL.**

They use social media and false promises of work or love to trap. By the time victims realize it, they are already trapped: no documents, no support network, no way out.

Technology + public policy

Technology is not a luxury: it is an essential tool to stay ahead of crime, make evidence-based decisions, and build effective public policy.



The fight against trafficking cannot rely on isolated efforts alone. That is why we propose a global, open, and interoperable technology platform, designed to make monitoring, reporting, and rapid response to potential trafficking cases easier. This database is not static: it is fed in real time with information from multiple actors—local governments, NGOs, international organizations, schools, and citizens—making it possible to generate risk maps, patterns of operation, and useful evidence for strategic intervention.

MODULE 1.

Human Trafficking: A Global Phenomenon

Objective: Provide a clear, up-to-date understanding of human trafficking, its causes, its forms, and the national and international context.

MODULE 2.

International and National Legal Framework

Objective: Learn the legal foundations behind the prevention, investigation, and punishment of human trafficking.

Topics
The Palermo Protocol and its application
International conventions (CEDAW, Belém do Pará, CRC)
General Law to Prevent, Punish, and Eradicate Crimes in the Area of Human Trafficking (Mexico, 2012)
Victims' rights and the human rights approach
Relevant case law and legal reforms

MODULE 3.

Comprehensive Victim Identification and Care

Objective: Build skills to recognize, assist, and properly refer victims from an ethical, human rights-based approach.

Topics
Who is a victim, and how can they be identified?
Vitiated consent and situations of vulnerability
Protocols for detection and first contact
Psychological first aid and preventing revictimization
Inter-institutional referral pathways
Social reintegration and redress

MODULE 4.

Prevention, Education, and the Media

Objective: Promote prevention strategies in educational, community, and social settings.

Topics
Primary, secondary, and tertiary prevention
Education for freedom: models from school, community, and faith
The role of media and social networks: ethics and responsibility
Effective campaigns and victim-centered narratives
Prevention projects in vulnerable sectors

MODULE 5.

A Gender, Childhood, and Vulnerable Groups Perspective

Objective: Take a deeper look at how trafficking disproportionately affects certain groups.

Topics
Trafficking and violence against women
Children and adolescents in trafficking situations
Migrants, Indigenous people, people with disabilities, and LGBTI+ people
An intersectional approach and affirmative action
The best interests of the child as a guiding principle

MODULE 6.

Investigation, Prosecution, and Administration of Justice

Objective: Analyze investigation and prosecution processes to strengthen how this crime is pursued.

Topics
Investigation with due diligence
Building case files and means of commission
Criminal penalties for traffickers and redress
Models of specialized prosecution offices and successful rulings
Use of digital evidence and international cooperation

MODULE 7.

Civil Society, Networks, and Citizen Participation

Objective: Promote community coordination and citizen advocacy.

Topics
The role of CSOs and foundations in care and prevention
National and international networks (such as Unidos vs Trata)
Models of shelters and protection
Political advocacy and social mobilization
Volunteering and community participation
Reporting

MODULE 8.

Final Capstone Project

Objective: Apply the knowledge acquired by developing a proposal with social impact.

Topics
A prevention or awareness campaign
A proposal for institutional reform or improvement
A care pathway for a specific community
A case analysis with recommendations
A testimony or life story with a restorative approach
